




CONFLICT RESOLUTION DAY

HOW CAN YOU PROMOTE CONFLICT RESOLUTION DAY?

DECLARE A PROCLAMATION

- Adopt a Conflict Resolution Day proclamation, or have students write individual pledges.
- Have students sign their pledge and display it prominently in school corridors. Integrate the pledge into your Conflict Resolution Day activities.





Host a **Mock Mediation** to show students the benefits.

Sponsor a **Peace Café** using a film like *Odd Girl Out* to discuss the topic of cyber bullying and how students can make a difference in their school.

Launch a school wide Increase the Peace! Campaign. Have students describe how they peacefully resolved a problem that day. Post these problem-solving methods on the walls.

Have students nominate **fellow student peacemakers** in their grade. Honor these peacemakers on Conflict Resolution Day.

Produce and distribute information on how to establish **peer mediation** programs.

KINDNESS IDEAS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Set up a peace corner or conflict resolution zone in the classroom.

Students can use it to:

- Calm down
- Talk out their problems
- Write out their thoughts & feelings


KINDNESS IDEAS MIDDLE SCHOOL

Set up a conflict free zone where students can talk out their problems. Have these rules available for them to follow. Some rules can include:

- Each person should speak one at a time.
- No name calling.

KINDNESS IDEAS HIGH SCHOOL

- Stick sticky notes on every locker in your school with something nice written on it like "you're beautiful" or "smile" or "you make a difference".
- In schools, cafeteria workers prépare food and clean the trays behind the scenes, but they never get thanked. An idea is to write a sticky note and stick it on the tray. It will surely make the cafeteria worker's day when they see it!
- Listen well to classmates sitting around you because if you listen well to somebody else, that person will be happy that you listen to his or her story.
- Everyone loves having friends. When you introduce yourself to somebody new, they'll feel warm inside too. Share the love, the fun.
- Practice speaking in a kind way. For one day, keep every negative thought, frustration or complaint to yourself and only share your positive comments with others. And every time you do have a negative thought, counter it out loud with a positive one. See the silver lining in the cloud in every situation.
- Have you ever been new at a school? Then maybe you know what it's like to be in a new environment, around new people. Being the new kid can often be stressful or even scary. Some kids have a hard time adjusting to new schools because they are shy or aren't very good at making new friends.




- Organize a **film festival** that highlights conflict resolution. Afterward, discuss peaceful conflict resolution strategies. Many popular children's movies and television shows already explore such themes.
- Create a mini-retreat! Dedicate part of Conflict Resolution Day to addressing common sources of conflict through workshops and group activities in class.
- Host an art, poetry, or t-shirt contest. Have students create artwork or t-shirts reflecting the theme of conflict and peaceful conflict resolution.
- Hold a "brown bag" professional development talk on a campus or for professionals in your community.
- Hold an educational event for students, or make a presentation in a classroom or school.

OTHER DAYS TO EDUCATE STUDENTS ON CONFLICT RESOLUTION







- Recognize conflict resolution leaders and/or volunteers in your community.
- Sponsor a day of cooperative games for peer mediators and the public.
- Have your students create a puppet show exploring ways to deal with conflict peacefully.
- Have students nominate fellow student peacemakers in their grade. Honor these peacemakers on Conflict Resolution Day.
- Organize a film festival that highlights conflict resolution. Afterward, discuss peaceful conflict resolution strategies. Many popular children's movies and television shows already explore such themes.
- Create a mini-retreat! Dedicate part of Conflict Resolution Day to addressing common sources of conflict through workshops and group activities in class.
- Host an art or t-shirt contest. Have students create artwork or t-shirts reflecting the theme of conflict and peaceful conflict resolution. Work with community partners at art galleries, libraries or museums to display the winning entries.
- Adopt a Conflict Resolution Day proclamation, or have students write individual pledges. Have your school peer mediation group, your Student Council or another group of student leaders draft and adopt a Conflict Resolution Day Proclamation. Have students sign their pledge and display it prominently in school corridors.
- Host a Mock Mediation for the public, policymakers, elected officials, community leaders/organizations, or school personnel.


WHY START A PEER MEDIATION PROGRAM?

- 1. Be aware of the <u>peer mediation</u> standards established by the Association for Conflict Resolution.
- 2. Pick a trainer who has experience and training in peer mediation. Trainers should be experienced mediators.
- 3. If you will be providing training, choose a curriculum that follows the Association for Conflict Resolution standards.
- 4. Know the adequate number of training hours students should receive.
 - Elementary: 12-18 hours
 - Middle: 12-18 hours
 - High: 15-20 hours
 - Advanced Training:
 - 12 hours/year

- 1. Conduct a needs assessment to find out the areas of conflict in your school.
- 2. Advertise your program among your staff and students.
- 3. Establish peer mediation protocols and how students will access services.
- 4. Provide practice for your students. The Online Peer Mediation Platform can provide free simulation practice for your students.
- 5. Keep records of mediation services to report your administration.
- 6. Conduct an evaluation of mediation training and services
